A Mile in His Shoes

David, a retired teacher in his seventies, is experiencing homelessness for the first time in his life after a new landlord purchased his apartment building and evicted him from his third floor unit. His daily routine is not one meant for a retiree – walking an hour to the Friendship Center from a 24 hour Denny's for a hot meal, a shower and clean clothes; traveling on foot to the library to face the uphill battle of applying for jobs; then finally trudging back to Denny's to sleep at an uncomfortable booth under glaring lights.

"This is someone's grandparent," mentions William Wicks, Friendship Center supervisor. "It's heartbreaking!" So when David asked for some boots to help with his daily commute, Wicks was proud to provide him with a pair of brand-new boots from home. "His feet are swollen, so even though my feet are bigger than his, they fit him perfectly. He was so appreciative."



Your Support In Action



69,610 meals were served between St. Elizabeth House and the Friendship Center.



154 people were served by our Permanent Supportive Housing program, which helps those with very low incomes and serious and persistent conditions have a place to call home.



119 people were served by our Rapid Rehousing program, which helped them find and maintain housing after experiencing literal homelessness.



171 individuals with complex needs were assisted on their road to recovery and housed through our residential programs.



Mercy Homeless Diversion staff kept **970 participants** in a housing crisis out of a homeless shelter:

- 587 participants in Greater Hartford were served in partnership with the Greater Hartford Coordinated Access Network.
- 383 participants in Greater Middletown were served in partnership with the Middletown-Meriden-Wallingford Coordinated Access Network.
